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
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Saying Thank You and Farewell to Fr. John

A MEMORABLE YEAR OF CENTENARIES

The year was memorable at a more personal level for many families in the community. Joyful occasions, like births and marriages, anniversaries and new jobs, had their sad counterpart in deaths and illness, departures and personal crises. So too for the Centre: the many successes and achievements were accompanied by setbacks and painful farewells.

Particular tribute is due to the late Eileen Ryan, who for twenty years had worked tirelessly to manage the finances of the Centre. As the Centre grew, Eileen developed the financial systems to ensure that our affairs were properly managed and that reports could be provided to funders. After giving so much to the community through the Centre, Eileen left the Centre two years ago to develop a new career in her own business. Sadly, she had little time to enjoy this. Her untimely death has deprived her son, Stephen, her family and many friends of a warm and loving person. Ar dheis De go raibh a hanam.

So we face another year, conscious that whatever it may bring, the care and solidarity of a caring community will sustain us, just as the Mercy of the Father that we have recalled this year encourages us to hope that the love of His son, whose birth we celebrate at Christmas, will prevail in our lives and in the fulfilment of history.

After the initial thumbs up it was decided The Junction would become a pop up gallery. This is the perfect space to promote the individually of the artists through a temporary exhibition. An invitation was extended to Sueanne Moore, local artist, Leslie Anderson, RTE arts archivist and Tony Strickland, a well know independent art curator to attend and make recommendations. If an exhibition was to go ahead then it was important for

PAST NICHOLS - THE UNDERTAKERS - Part 4

Bloomsday 1904-2004 by Paula Howard

On Thursday 16th June 1904, Mr. Leopold Bloom left his house, No. 7 Eccles Street, to the sound of the bells of St. George's Church in Hardwicke Place – and walked into literary history.

On his rambling journey, he walked

along Sir John Rogerson Quay, went through Lime Street, crossed Townsend Street and went down Lombard Street passing "the frowning face of Bethel" (the Salvation Army Hall, situated between Nos. 19 & 20), "and past Nichols' the undertakers" (nos. 26-31), 2.

He crossed Great Brunswick Street, and paused at the window of the Belfast and Oriental Tea Company, No. 6 Westland Row, underneath the railway bridge. He sauntered across Westland Row and into the Post Office beside the Railway Station to collect a letter addressed to Henry Flower, esq. He went back towards Great Brunswick Street, went round the corner, passed the cab stand with its patient horses, "their long noses stuck in nosebags", and into Cumberland Street, where he opened his letter.

His was a very different time, almost unimaginable to us today. It was an era of emperors and kings, a time of enormous wealth for a few, a comfortable life for an increasing middle class,, an improving standard of living for tradesmen and those in reasonable employment, and grinding poverty – and frequently appalling health – for the badly paid and the unemployed, who formed the majority of

most populations.

As Leopold Bloom walked past his premises, Charles Nichols was attending to his day's business. A hearse, drawn by a pair of horses, and two attendants were to take a coffin from Harcourt Street Station to the Glasgow Steamer, which sailed from the North Wall. Three carriages, three clarences and a landau had been ordered for that day by clients. He would have checked with his head groom to make sure that the horses selected for the day's work were all sound and that their harness, the hearse, and the other carriages were all clean and polished. He would also have been aware that Mackie Burns & Co. of Prussia Street had a sale of 230 horses, cobs and ponies at noon that day. On checking the office copy of *The Irish Times*, he would have seen that Sewell's of Lower Mount Street were advertising the sale of, among others, carriages, brougham and harness horses on the following Thursday – Sewell's was on his way home and

he often called in as he passed by. Sammon's Horse Repository on North King Street was advertising a sale of harness horses, including a black horse, on the Thursday after that. Charles was always on the look-out for quality carriage horses, especially like all undertakers, for black ones.



At home. in No. 20 Northumberland Road, his young wife, Madeline, was expecting their second child; their first Arthur, was already in the nursery. Madeline, was his second

wife. His first wife, Mary, had died in 1898, leaving him with three sons and five daughters.

All in all, it was business as usual at the office for Charles, and for his older brother James, who carried on a glass, china and hardware business nearby at No. 180 Great Brunswick Street.

Rather than discuss one item with this article I thought I would try to touch on a number of different topics. Medicine is changing all the time with new discoveries and

new treatments. I thought it would be a good idea to touch on some new developments and the changes that are taking place or about to take place soon.

A number of changes are about to occur with childhood vaccines. The main change is to do with **Meningitis** and in particular **Meningococcus meningitis**. As with many bugs, there are a number of different types of the meningococcus bug. The main types are given a letter identity there – A,B,C,W,X,Y. This


means that no one vaccine will cover you against them all. Back in 2000 Men C was the most common and most dangerous and Men C vaccine was introduced. This vaccine was so effective that it has almost eliminated Men C from this country. However children can still get meningococcus meningitis and most of the rest are caused by Men B. now we finally have a Men B vaccine and every child born after October 2016 is going to get the Men B and Men C vaccine. Our hope is that soon we will be training young doctors who never see a case of meningococcus meningitis.

This new vaccine is extremely safe, but monitoring and checks will continue for many years to come. This vaccine is in use in the UK since last year and is in other European countries for longer, so we have great confidence in it.

Another change in vaccine is the start of a **Rotavirus** vaccine for babies. Rotavirus is the most common cause of diarrhoea and vomiting in children under the age of 5 years. While this is rarely fatal, a number of small babies end up in hospital requiring fluids from a drip. Now this vaccine will be added to the list of vaccines new babies get and in time we hope to eliminate this type of diarrhoea.

Before we leave vaccines, it is worth mentioning a new vaccine for adults. This is a vaccine against shingles and it currently being given to adults in the UK. This is a more complex issue because shingles comes from the chicken pox virus and the only way to stop it completely is to get rid of chicken pox. The virus lives on the spine of people and comes out years later as shingles. This vaccine is therefore doing something new − trying to stop the virus coming out again as opposed to trying to stop us getting the virus in the first place. Unfortunately this vaccine is only about 50% successful in doing that. In addition it cost €300 approximately so it is currently not available as standard in Ireland yet.

The next major development I want to mention is in the area of **HEPATITIS C.** This is one of a number of viruses that attack the liver. We have a vaccine against hepatitis



to tolerate. Also it was not very effective, with it only working in about 10% of patients with certain strains of the hep C virus. Also the interferon had to be injected and this was not acceptable for many people.

Now we have very effective tablets to do this job. They are antiviral tablets which are the equivalent of taking antibiotics for bacterial infection. These antiviral tablets have fewer side effects and do not need to be injected. Even more important they are

over 95% effective in clearing all strains of the Hep C virus, and once cleared these people are cured. Of course there is a down side – the cost. The average course of treatment costs about €60,000. There is now a call going out to anyone with Hep C to get back in touch with their doctors and get referred on for treatment.

While the contraceptive pill has been around for over 50 years, there is still ongoing research on it. Most women on the pill have been told at some stage to be careful if they take a course of antibiotics. This was based on the belief that the antibiotic interfered with the pill and you were more likely to get pregnant. This has now been shown not to be true so that advice can be ignored.

All doctors were warned not to keep women on the pill over the age of 35 years because of the risk of a clot. Once again this information is now considered out of date and they can stay on the pill up to the age of 50 years of age if they wish to. However there is an important warning with this – they can stay on it as long as they are not smoking. There are also some other concerns to consider – whether they have high blood pressure or whether they are very obese, both of which increase their risk of clot.

The mirena coil is not exactly new but it continues to surprise us with results. Some bright spark took the ordinary coil, soaked it in the female hormone **PROGESTERONE** and the results have been spectacular. Not only was it a very effective contraceptive but it also

cut back completely on heavy bleeding. The number of women going for surgery to remove the womb because of very heavy periods has dropped to close to zero. Now doctors are simply putting in a mirena coil and that fixes the problem.

THE QUEENS THEATRE 1950 by Jerry Browne

Did you know that the Queens Theatre was originally built in 1829 and was known as the Adelphi Theatre. It was demolished in 1844 and rebuilt. It reopened that same year as the Queens Royal Theatre. It acquired this illustrious title because the new owner had been granted Royal Patent to operate it as a patent theatre. However it quickly became known as simply the Queens. The Queens Theatre was situated opposite the fire station at the top of Pearse Street. In its day the Queens was a major attraction for

theatre goers for seven nights of the week. It was always packed especially at the weekend. It was most famous in the 20th century as the home of the Happy Gang, a troupe of comics, singers and musicians including Danny Cummins, Cecil Nash and many more. Many other Irish artistes such as Cecil Sheridan, Michael Eustace, Mickser Reid, Jack Cruise, and his singer accompanist Sean Mooney also graced the stage of the Queens. Gloria Greene originally from Grattan Street, was another leading member of the Happy Gang. Gloria played the Principle Boy in all the Pantomimes.

In addition major artists from all over the world would appear on the stage of the Queens, one example being Charlie Chaplin who appeared here regularly before he became famous. When these artistes were on stage they played to packed houses. In addition a local talent competition was held every weekend where people from all over Dublin would sing, dance, tell a few jokes etc. The resident orchestra leader Alec Fryer, was also very popular with the audience.

The caretaker and usher of the theatre, Mr. McShane,

lived with his family in a house next door to the Queens. He was a well-liked family man who always had a friendly word of welcome to the patrons who entered the theatre. His three sons went to St.

Andrews National School in Pearse Street. One son, Ronnie McShane was a very popular and well like pupil in the school. Ronnie had a great sense of humour. He cheered up all the pupils in the school. Ronnie played with the Chieftains in later life.

Long before that well-loved TV comedy series, *Mrs. Brown's Boys,* came on the scene, a comedy show known as Old Mother Reilly was regularly performed on the Queens. This show featured English actor

Arthur Lucan and his wife Kitty McShane who was a sister of Mr. McShane the caretaker. Old Mother Reilly was world famous act; indeed there were a number of films made in England with the title Old Mother Reilly – 18 films in all. To name but two: Old Mother Reilly Oversea and Old Mother Reilly Oversea and Old Mother Reilly's Circus. Kitty played old Mother



Reilly's daughter in all the movies. Whenever they showed a Old Mother Reilly film in the local cinema in Pearse Street, The Palace, one could hear the laughter from the street outside. Unfortunately, tragedy struck the Abbey Theatre in 1951 when a fire

broke out in the backstage area. This happened on the 18th of July 1951. So the Abbey Theatre had to relocate and a new temporary home was found for it in the shape



of the Queens. It stayed there till 1966, whence it moved back to its brand new premises in Abbey Street where it is to this day. Sadly the final curtain came down the Queens in 1969 and it was demolished in 1975 – and that was the end of The Happy Gang - a

sad day for Dublin!







St. ANDREW'S PARISH HERITAGE WORKING GROUP



St. Andrew's Church, Westland Row found itself in the centre of the Rebellion of 1916. Close by were rebel holds at Boland's Mills, St. Stephen's Green, Mount Street Bridge and the GPO. Diocesan records mentioned that Fr. Fleming & Fr. O'Reilly, the then clergy of St. Andrew's Church, both risked their lives on numerous occasions. undertaking errands of mercy to those on Mount St Bridge and, under heavy crossfire, administering to the dying in Boland's Mill.






High Altar, St. Andrew's Church, Westland Row 1922

The images above and on the right show how different St. Andrew's Church, Westland Row, looked in 1916. The current layout of the church is compliant with the changes of the Second Vatican Council 1962. Some of you may recall that before 1962 Mass was celebrated in Latin, with the altar at a distance and the priest turned away from the congregation.

Westland Row, one of Dublin's prominent streets, also has strong connections to the Rebellion of 1916. Aside from the profile of the area Westland Row was the only Dublin stop for the Kingstown railway. In 1917 those who were imprisoned for their part in the rebellion returned via this Kingstown railway and were greeted by throngs of crowds on Westland Row.

Westland Row was lined with Irish citizens for the funeral corteges of Arthur Griffith and Countess Markievicz. St. Andrew's Church, Westland Row was frequently visited by Maude Gonne and Eamon De Valera.

The Plunketts lived on Fitzwilliam St. A devoutly catholic family; Joseph's father was a Papal Count. Joseph met Grace Gifford through Thomas Mc Donagh, Grace's brother-in-law. Grace was raised a protestant. She was a very talented artist and studied under William Orpen.

Through Plunkett, Grace became interested in Catholicism. She was accepted into the Catholic faith in April 1916 in time to marry Plunkett days later in Kilmainham Jail Chapel. They had 10 minutes of married life before Plunkett like McDonagh was executed.

I see his blood upon the rose And in the stars the glory of his eyes His body gleams amid eternal snows, His tears fall from the skies.



The Pearse brothers Padraig and William (Willie) are closely connected to St. Andrew's Church. Residing in Great Brunswick St., now Pearse Street, they the Christian attended Brothers School. Both were teachers - Padraig skilled in law and poetry and Willie a gifted sculptor. Significant figures in the Rebellion of 1916, both were executed. On the night execution Padraig penned -The Mother.

Willie carved the statue of "Our Lady of Sorrows" situated above the altar in the Mortuary Chapel. It was donated to St. Andrew's Church in the 1930s.



DUBLIN PORT TRADE INCREASES 6.8% IN FIRST NINE MONTHS OF 2016



On 20th October 2016, Dublin Port has announced new figures showing a 6.8% increase in trade volumes for the first nine months of the year. The current pace of

growth puts Dublin Port on course for a record year for the third year in a row.

Total throughput (imports and exports) for the nine months to the end of September was 26.0 million gross tonnes.

Exports moved ahead by 7.0% to 10.6 million gross tonnes in the first nine months, while imports climbed by 6.7% to 15.4 million gross tonnes, reflecting ongoing

improvement in the domestic economy.

Ro-Ro freight trailers and Lo-Lo containers are the mainstay of Dublin Port's business and they continue to show very strong growth.

Ro-Ro cargo arriving on trailer-trucks and lorries increased by 7.6% to 699,361 units, while Lo-Lo containers moved ahead by 9.3% to 495,304 TEU.

More than 77,000 new vehicles were imported through Dublin Port in the first nine months, up 9.8% on the same period last year as demand for new cars and commercial vehicles showed little sign of abating. Meanwhile ferry passenger traffic experienced a slight uplift by 0.5% as 1.4m ferry passengers and over 400,000 tourist vehicles passed through the port, as holidaymakers and Ireland soccer fans took advantage of direct routes to France and Britain.

Dublin Port's cruise business grew with 103 cruise calls in the first nine months bringing 152,000 cruise visitors to the capital.

Eamonn O'Reilly, Chief Executive, Dublin Port Company, said:

"At 6.8% growth in the first nine months of the year, we are now certain that 2016 will be the third record year in a row for trade at Dublin Port. We are seeing the re-emergence of exponential compounding growth which has characterised the business of Dublin Port for many decades.

"In the period to September this year, we handled the same volume as we did in the whole of 2009, our lowest point after the economic collapse.



"The pace of growth is so strong that if current growth levels were to continue into the future, Dublin Port's volumes would double over the 12 years to 2025.

Our challenge now is how best to create additional port capacity in sufficient time to stay ahead of this growth.

"As part of our plans to maximise capacity at Dublin Port, we have purchased 44 hectares of motorway connected lands 14 km from the Port and we will develop these as an External

Port Logistics Zone over the next five years to increase the capacity of the Port to cater for future growth.

"We are also preparing plans for the development of over 50 hectares of port lands on the Poolbeg Peninsula both within the area of the West Poolbeg SDZ and elsewhere on the peninsula. These plans are an integral part of our Masterplan 2012 to 2040 which shows how we will develop the Port to accommodate a doubling in throughput".

One of the plants covered by the tide on sheltered shores of Dublin Bay is Samphire (or Salicornia). It is a wild plant that has recently become a fashionable food in delicatessens. This is an annual plant, germinating on muddy sand and it is a pioneer for saltmarsh vegetation. You can see it from the causeway to the Bull Island and on the shore at Booterstown.

Vendée Globe Challenge and Atlantic Youth Trust Programme launch





Docklands Oversight and Consultative Forum

A process is currently underway to appoint representatives to the newly established Docklands Oversight and Consultative Forum. The Forum will consider and advise the Council and the strategic policy committees of the Council in relation to the formulation, development, monitoring and review of the Council's policy relating to the performance of the functions of the Council insofar as they relate to the Dublin Docklands Area and in particular in relation to enterprise and employment, education, housing, planning, the environment, including the natural and built environment, and the amenities of the area and the interaction of communities.

The Forum will consist of a Chairperson and 21 ordinary members, all of whom will be appointed by the Minister, and nominated as follows:

- An independent Chairperson to be nominated by the Chief Executive Dublin City Council, following consultation with the Council,
- the Chief Executive of Dublin City Council or his nominee,
- 4 Elected Members of the City Council nominated by the City Council from electoral areas included in the Dublin Docklands area,
- 5 members from among persons selected by not less than 5 prescribed* organisations which, in the opinion of the Minister, are concerned with or representative of persons engaged in community development in the Docklands Area, engaged in the promotion of the social, economic or general interest of communities in the Dublin Docklands area or represent the general interest of the residents in the Dublin Docklands Area,
- 5 members from among persons selected by not less than 5 prescribed* organisations which in the opinion of the Minister, are representative of persons engaged in the promotion or carrying out of economic activity (including employment) in the Dublin docklands Area,
- 1 member from among persons selected by a prescribed* organisation (or organisations) which, in the opinion of the Minister, is representative of persons engaged in the promotion or carrying out of educational activities in the Dublin Docklands Area and
- 5 members from among persons selected by not less than 5 prescribed* public authorities which, in the opinion of the Minister, are concerned with or whose functions relate to, any of the functions of the Forum insofar as these matter relate to the Dublin Docklands Area.

Christmas Plum Pudding

Plum pudding is easy to store, great fun to make and delicious to eat. These simple steps will have you all set for Christmas dessert ahead of time.

Prep time: 60 minutes Cook time: 120-300 minutes Servings: 10 people

Method 1

Cream margarine and sugar until light and fluffy Add the lightly beaten eggs and mix well.

Stir in the sieved flour, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg and mixed spice. Next add the raisins, sultanas, mixed peel, cherries and ground almonds.

Mix well. Finally, add the breadcrumbs and bottle of stout. Stir well, cover and leave to stand overnight.

Transfer to a 1 1/2 litre/3 pint greased pudding bowl.

Cover pudding with greaseproof paper and secure with string or tinfoil. Place pudding in a saucepan with water half way up the side.

Cover and steam for 5 hours or longer.

The longer the pudding cooks the richer and darker it becomes. Top up saucepan with boiling water as required and don't let it boil dry.

Method 2

To steam pudding in the oven follow these steps Put two long strips of tin foil crosswise on work top. Place roasting tin on foil. Sit pudding bowl into the tin and fill with boiling water to within 2cms/1" of top of tin.

Then bring tin foil around to form a parcel, which should be airtight to prevent any steam escaping.

Place in preheated oven at 150°C/300°F/Gas 2 for the same length of time as above

There is no need to top up with water during cooking. Steam pudding for 2 hours and serve.

Ingredients

75g Odlums Self Raising Flour

175g Shamrock Light Muscovado Sugar

175g Margarine

3 Eggs

1/2 teaspoon Cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon Nutmeg

1 teaspoon Mixed Spice

Pinch of Salt

225g Shamrock Raisins

225g Shamrock Sultanas

125g Shamrock Mixed Peel

100g tub Shamrock Cherries 100g packet Shamrock Ground Almonds

175g Breadcrumbs

1 bottle Stout (300m/1/2 pint)

In Memory of the Gardener by Sonny Kinsella

The following poem you are about to read is about a very good friend who worked in the same factory as I did for many years. His name was Tom Hickey and he was a professional landscape gardener having

served his time in Kew Gardens, London. C.P.C. Ireland was an American Corporation food factory. I worked in the Maintenance Department while Tom was responsible for keeping the grounds in excellent condition. The grounds consisted of four car parks and a nine hole pitch and putt course, a football field and huge lawns and flower beds to the back and front of the factory and offices.

In the front of the main entrance was a lovely rose garden with a tree on each side of it. Tom kept them all in excellent condition throughout the whole year and at Christmas time he would have both trees decked out with the Christmas lights. The grounds were a great credit to him. Tom was the most liked person you would ever meet, always happy, and could be heard singing Irish ballads throughout the day – he never missed a day out of work and was never in bad humour. He enjoyed every minute of his work, especially in the summer. On rainy days you would find Tom in his stores cleaning and sharpening his gardening equipment, even his lockup stores were kept tidy. I often dropped over to see him for a chat and he'd stop, light up a cigarette and it was then that he would tell me many stories and yarns of his past life which were very interesting and sometimes funny. I hated having to leave him because of the great way he had of telling these stories. Unfortunately there was sadness in them too, he told me that his wife never settled down in London and wanted to move back to Dublin and so reluctantly he had to leave Kew Gardens in London and head back to home to Dublin. It wasn't too long till he got the job as landscape gardener in C.P.C. Ireland, as their gardener was retiring. For many years Tom carried on until one day he didn't show up for work. As he had never missed as day from work this was very strange and it was later the next day word came in that Tom had been taken to hospital. This surprised us as he was the picture of health and a strongly built man. After two months Tom came back to work, but he was the opposite to what he had been. This time he looked pale and had lost weight. We were all glad to see Tom back, but it was to be only temporary. Within six weeks Tom had to give in his notice as he couldn't cope any more. The Company gave him a good send off and the whole staff was sad to see him leaving for the last time. It was a few weeks later that word came in that Tom had died from cancer on the 27th of November 1990 at 6 o'clock in the morning, peacefully, and as a tribute to this old Dubliner, I decided to write the following in his memory.

"Don't Sing Sad Songs For Me"

This time I write with a heavy heart No joy, no laughs, no stories For Tom our friend for many long years Has been called to higher glories The year of '90 took its toll, It was to be our friend's last year And we never believed that when it came We would lose a friend so dear He fell sick, late in that same year And to hospital he was sent, For weeks he lay in his sick bed His time was nearly spent But no one know, not even Tom That death was drawing near For a man so fit and healthy Worked hard and knew no fear A character no doubt he was A Dubliner through and through The stories and the yarns he told Could be matched by very few No books has told of Tom's exploits No recorded tapes for us to listen When he sat down to tell those varns His eyes would often glisten The rare ould times has lost a pal For he was a part of Dublin And when St Peter opens the pearly gates Tom will set the heavens bubblin He will tell the angels and the saints All the yarns he told down here And it won't be long till heaven has The friend we loved so dear So goodbye old pal, God guide you home You'll be sadly missed by all of us Your tales and yarns no more we'll hear For now, you've caught your last bus.

Tom died 27th November 1990 at 6.00am RIP







PERSONAL SAFETY (Security for the older person)



Believe it or not – older people are less often the victims of crime than many of their younger neighbours. Older persons are, however, subjected to burglary and thefts as frequently as the rest of us.

Home Security

- Fit a door view/chain or limiter. This will allow you to see who is outside or open door partly.
- Front and rear doors should be kept locked day and night. Windows should also be locked.
- Keep a list of emergency numbers, such as

Gardaí, family, doctors and neighbours.

Number your house clearly so Gardaí and

emergency services can find you quickly when necessary.

Distraction Burglary

Unfortunately, older persons are frequently targeted for this crime. *Take precautions:*

- Do not open door to anyone before you have checked who they are.
- Check identification.
- Do not leave strangers unattended at your door step.
- Ensure your back door is locked when you answer the door.

HOME SECURITY

Burglars like easy opportunities. If they have to make a lot of noise, spend a lot of time or risk being seen, the chances are they won't bother. A good rule of thumb is the 3 minute delay test. If you can deny entry for 3 minutes or more – the chances are the burglars will go elsewhere.

Most intruders entering your property will either enter through a door or a window. It is not uncommon for people to leave doors and windows open, unlocked or not properly secured.

Whether an intruder will gain access to your home through an external doors/windows may depend on:

- the strength of the construction material;
- the quality of the locks;
- proper fitting and installation.

We can reduce their attraction as an entry point for the burglar by trying to minimise these risk features.

The following security measures may help to deter the burglar:

- Don't advertise your absence, inform a trusted neighbour when you will be away for long periods to watch the house and collect post.
- Always check the identity of repairmen etc. calling to the house.
- If you have overgrown shrubbery/trees blocking view of house cut them back.
- Never leave access keys under mats, plant pots or dustbins – they will be found.
- Do not keep large amount of cash in your home. Store all valuable items in a safe.

Ensure garden shed is securely locked as they are a common source of implements for the burglar.



Some very important pieces were sourced from "Westland Row CBS", including Willie Pearse's Tunic which was on loan to us for the duration of the Exhibition. The Exhibition was launched after 11:30am Mass by Fr John Gilligan, who spoke about Padraig and Willie Pearse's contributions to the 1916 Rising. During the Mass Father John also announced that Bill Taylor was retiring after 20 years of service to the community. We all wish Bill the very best of health and happiness in his retirement. After the Mass, Bill Taylor officially opened the Exhibition in the side corridor of the church, cutting the ribbon to launch the Exhibition. Bill was also the editor of the 1916 Booklet and the Exhibition was dedicated to Bill, reflecting his many years of great service to our community. We sincerely thank all those who contributed to the success of the exhibition and it remains on view in St. Andrew's Resource Centre, in Room 3, until early 2017.

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
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William Bligh and the Dublin Connection

As we approach the festive season of 2016 Michael Rossiter most of us if not all will be making plans

for how we will spend the Christmas holidays. Many will travel, walk, visit the cinema etc. However if like me you like to walk then you could do no better than to take a few hours and travel down to the Great South Wall. Many locals from Ringsend and surrounding areas will know this by its local name The Shelly Banks. The Shelly Banks has

been a favourite of locals and visitors for generations. It is a beautiful area of the city and if you visit especially on weekends you will be one among thousands who do the same. However, this area including the South Wall has a

very interesting history, as many years ago Dublin bay had an ongoing problem with the build-up of sand (silt)... This was a problem to the British authorities who then decided to solve this problem. They decided to reclaim land, which ran from the City to Ringsend in the late 17th and early 18th centuries. After years of primitive dredging a wall was proposed to run from Ringsend to what would eventually become known as The Poolbeg Lighthouse which was completed in 1761. The granite for this project was sourced from the quarry in Dalkey and

shipped across the bay. Later the British added a gun Battery and what is now known as the Pigeon House Fort. Further up river Sir John Rogerson paid for the construction of a massive quay which was later was to be the site for the



employment of many locals from Pearse Street, Ringsend, East Wall and surrounding areas. The wall and the various facilities that the British added later are not the only interesting fact. How many people have heard of Mr. William Bligh of Her Majesty's Navy?

Well most of us who are old enough have probably seen the famous film Mutiny on the Bounty. The Captain of

this ship was one William Bligh;

however, he had another qualification, and that of a marine surveyor. Bligh was born in Plymouth in 1754 and in 1800 he was invited to come to Dublin and survey the bay. It is reported that he allegedly stayed in The Pigeon House Fort during his stay. It was decided by Bligh after he



finished his survey to construct the Great Bull Wall. These two walls are what keep the channel clear so that shipping can flow easily in and out of our main port, bringing much needed commerce and jobs to our city. For many residents of Ringsend, Irishtown and Pearse Street their working days were spent along Sir John Rogerson's Quay for the various stevedore firms that operated along this quay and other parts of the docks. In my own family my mother's brothers Ned and Mickser Brennan were dockers along with their father my Granada Michael Brennan. Although with the passing of time many Dockers have passed on to Fiddlers Green, many still remain like Mickser Brennan, John Hawkins, Noel Gura Murphy, John Gidda Murphy and Louis Doyle. So when over the yule tide period when walking along either the North or South bull walls spare a thought for William Bligh, the once alleged Ringsend resident and friend to the Dockers of the City of Dublin.

Ringsend and District Response to Drugs (RDRD), the board of management of the Spellman Centre held their Annual Event on Thursday 9th. June in the Clanna Gael Hall. According to their chairperson Tom Crilly RDRD was established in 1995, marking 21 years of providing an important service to the south inner city. linked to the South Inner City Drugs Task Force we network with a range of other community, political, voluntary groups and the state agencies; from the Ringsend Forum Network to the Irishtown Gardai, from the Merchants Quay Project to the Junior Minister responsible for the National Drugs Strategy.

Minister for the National Drugs Strategy Catherine Byrne T.D., also our three local Councillors Sonya Stapleton, Chris Andrews and Dermot Lacey..also Cllr. Daithi Doolan,,also Jim O Callaghan T.D... Thanks to all the local community groups and the voluntary groups for putting up an information stall around the hall on the night and also to our sponsors Dublin Port Company.

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
