



As Christmas approaches there is, more than usually, a sense of apprehension about what the New Year may bring, even as the Christmas celebrations get under way. A new President with a radical agenda in the United States, a new government to be formed at home, escalating wars with immense suffering and the accelerating climate crisis: there's not much comfort as we survey the scene.

Closer to home, this has been a difficult year for many families and perhaps none more than the family of St. Andrew's Resource Centre. We lost our long – standing leader and friend, John Fitzimons RIP. His untimely death in June shocked us all and removed one has been for so many years the very heart of the Centre. Over the months since we have honoured his memory in the first instance by keeping every service operating fully and continuing to develop what we had planned with him. We have been taking time to reflect on how best to move forward and what sort of new leadership and management structures we need to put in place. John's passion for the Centre and its work, no less than the needs of the community, deserve careful planning of the transition to the next stage of our journey.

Like all bereaved families, we find comfort in remembering the many happy days and successful projects to which John contributed so much. We take comfort from his belief that everyone has the potential to make a profound contribution to making our community a better place to live and work. John's legacy and our own experience reflects the vision that gave rise to the Centre and so much good work that happens in our community: namely, that we are meant to be generous and caring people because we were created by One who is love itself.

Love can't help but express itself through sharing and self sacrifice. That is the heart of the Christmas story, that God became human in the form of a helpless infant so that our human condition could be transformed:divine becoming human so that human can touch the divine.

Even on dark days there is hope. It is why we can say with real meaning despite challenges and foreboding: Happy Christmas. Peace on Earth and Goodwill to All.

EULOGY FOR JOHN FITZSIMONS

When the Christian community gathers to say farewell, the deceased person is referred to as brother or sister. In the case of John Fitzsimons, this is not a figure of speech. Of course, he was Ellie's beloved partner and a proud and loving uncle, and while Marian and Martina were his siblings, John was a brother to us all. We were all drawn into a relationship with John which was deeper than friendship. His presence, his availability, his optimism, his zest for life, his care for people, especially those who needed time and understanding, wrapped us in an embrace - often a physical one - which we thought would never end.

John was a proud son of this community. His was a happy home and a happy childhood. He liked to recall the places around the area where he played and explored and got up to mischief. He often regretted that today's children don't have the same freedom. John said in a newspaper interview that his abiding childhood memories were the smells in the area – from the gas company, Bolands Bakery and the local abbatoir – not all were missed! Many of John's childhood friends remained lifelong friends, some of them indeed colleagues in the Resource Centre. As a young man, his interest focused on music, playing with pals, writing songs and dreaming of a career as a performer.

I've known John for nearly 40 years, since he first began to work in the Resource Centre after the building was made over to the community by the Archdiocese of Dublin. But I felt that I already knew him because I knew his father Paddy who, like John, had a passion for the community and an infectious exuberance that encouraged us on the committee developing the Social Service Centre in the 1970s to aim high, even when the going was particularly tough. John inherited his father's positive outlook but also his mother's sensitivity; it was a winning combination.

At first, I think he saw a role in the Centre as giving him scope to develop his passion for music and maybe build a career performing and writing. While he never lost the passion for music, he quickly came to recognise that his true vocation was to serve his community. He knew the benefits of a strong community that supported its members. He realised that this area was changing and that the culture in which he had been raised was under pressure from social and economic developments. He saw the resource centre as embodying the values of community and solidarity that could no longer be sustained by informal networks alone. In this, his instincts coincided with the philosophy behind the development of the resource centre: to cater for everyone, to focus on the needs of individuals and families, to bring services together under one roof to reflect the joined-up nature of people's lives and challenges, to develop people's talents and to enable local people whenever possible to fill roles serving the changing needs of the community.

Under John's leadership as Administrator, the Centre grew and greatly developed the range of its programmes and the spread of its activities. From the childcare centre for toddlers run by Martina to the day centre for older people and at all the stages of life in between, the Centre has developed a wide range of services drawing on the expertise of many disciplines and professions.



John's approach was always to embrace challenges and to innovate creative responses to emerging needs. The Centre's reputation for excellence and integrity reflected John's own commitment to high standards. John had a listening ear and an open door, always alert to emerging concerns in the area and to facilitate groups developing new activities. He gave the same positive response to the many requests for advice or assistance from other organisations, statutory and voluntary including taking over or assisting struggling services at the request of the HSE, Tusla, the Department of Social Protection and Dublin City Council. John became heavily involved in supporting the community in Charlemont Street to adjust and adapt to the challenges of regeneration. Never was the spirit of dedicated service more in evidence than during Covid when, from day one, John led the Centre to stand by the community, developing new ways of connecting with people and keeping an open door when many others were closed. John saw this time of great challenge as helping the Centre to renew its roots in the community and so underline its mission to serve and respond.

John's view of life meant that the Centre was also about celebrating all that is good in life and in the community. His own interest in music and literature led him to play an active role in the City Arts Centre and, with their support to initiate the South Docks Festival which continues as an annual celebration of creativity and community. It was John's idea to initiate a Bloomsday Breakfast to celebrate the anniversary of the official opening of the Centre on 16 June 1989 by marking the building's brief appearance in Ulysses. How could we imagine when we celebrated Bloomsday with hundreds of people attending less than two weeks ago that we would be gathered today to bid farewell to its originator.? It was the same spirit of celebration that led to the Winter Wonderland event in the Centre over recent Christmases, encouraging families to celebrate while enabling the Centre's team to channel their inner elves!

Remarkable as the growth of the Centre has been, even more remarkable was the style with which John lead it. It was simply unique. No management manual could begin to describe John's style of living and working. His door was always open, he felt his voice was more effective than any internal telephone system, his unsinkable optimism challenged those who might feel defeated or defeatist. His sense of humour defused tensions, raised spirits, defied challenges and confounded critics. His enduring qualities made every 'no' sound and feel like a 'yes', every conversation as having his full and undivided attention, his cheery confidence inspiring trust and hope. Above all, John modelled the virtues and values which the Centre proclaims. No one was more committed or resourceful or professional or welcoming. Those who got short shift at other doors were welcome at his. Those whose needs never seemed to lessen nor their spirits to rise were always welcome. He had a kind and encouraging word for all, but especially for those for whom life was very hard going.

But the cheery smile and lighthearted banter that marked John's style belied his serious work ethic. There were many aspects of paperwork which John despised. He was vexed by the amount of time and effort required to complete returns and records which he felt contributed little to meeting needs but often served to create traps for the unwary. But John was assiduous in his own system of paperwork. He created and reviewed lists of things to do with daily rigour. Along with his open door policy, he was behind his door at all hours, on Saturday mornings, on Christmas Eve, on bank holiday Monday afternoons, so that things would get done and he would have time and space to think.

The depth of John 's passion for the community and the Centre was matched only by his affection for Ellie and his family. He enjoyed the company of friends, especially when music and singing were involved. He enjoyed good meals and good company, but above all he enjoyed quiet times at home, simply savouring the affection and companionship which we were all delighted to know that he had found. When John sang, it was with his soul and a voice that was unmistakable, pure and true

My own relationship with John has been one of the happier and most enduring aspects of my life. To say we were different would be an understatement. My instincts tend to be pessimistic and my style is bureaucratic. When difficulties arose, my instinct was to look at the darkest possibilities while John's was to see the brightest opportunity . Somehow we zigzagged our way to solutions and almost inevitably, John would be vindicated by success. My caution stood in awe of his optimism. On more than one occasion when we were summoned to be carpeted by some agency for an infraction of one kind or another, I would marvel at John's ability to charm those who had set out to chastise but who melted under the force of his charm and we left the building being thanked rather than rebuked.

John's pride in the Centre and its achievements was a joy to behold. As he led countless visitors around the Centre, his description of its facilities would do justice to a tour guide in Buckingham Palace. Kubla Khan had no stately pleasure dome more impressive than our hall, at least in John's eyes. His account of the work of the Centre its achievements was lyrical. His creative and poetic side found full expression and I would often sit back and marvel at his account of what was being done and what was being planned, wondering what organisation he might be describing, certainly not one I knew. But that was John: passionate, positive, persuasive, persistent.

No account of John and his life would be complete without referring to his spirituality. John was a deeply spiritual person. His faith in divine providence was often much greater than mine. He had utter certainty about the meaning of life and the promise of eternal life. He had no doubt but that the Lord was at work in his and all our lives and that the Spirit of love would ultimately prevail. His beliefs were eclectic but they were rooted in the faith in which he was raised. He saw the spiritual side of the work of the Centre as being of critical importance. He saw the links between the Centre and the parishes of Westland Row and City Quay as giving its true identity. He was so proud that only a few weeks ago the Centre hosted the whole Diocesan family at a reception following the ordination of Bishop Donal Roche here in this church. Indeed, John was here with the team who had worked so hard to prepare for that special day. His comment - sure we're all St. Andrew's. Little did we know that those preparations were to make the church ready and fitting to receive him for his funeral Mass today.

Travelling home from Rome after hearing the shocking news of John's sudden death I had time to think about John and his life and work. It was a life marked above all by love: of family, of community, of Ellie, of life. The image that came to my mind as I reflected on those many long years of friendship and brotherhood was the image of St Francis of Assisi. Like Francis, John was a simple soul, he saw things clearly, he devoted his life to celebrating what he knew to be truly important. He was joyful and the joy was infectious. Like Francis, John didn't take himself too seriously ; he saw himself as part of God's wonderful creation and his place in it as being to serve others by reflecting the joy he found in knowing the truth about life.

John died on the feast of St Aloysius Gonzaga, a young nobleman who, like St Francis, gave up everything to follow his dream and who died at a young age from fever contracted when helping the sick. He is the patron saint of youth. Isn't it appropriate that if John had to leave us, it should be on the feast of the patron of youth?

Because, John was forever young:

- John, you built a ladder to the stars and you climbed on every rung.
- You grew up to be righteous. You grew up to be true. You always knew the truth and saw the light surrounding you;
- You always were courageous, stood upright and strong;
- You had a strong foundation when the winds of changes blew;
- Your heart was always joyful, now may your song always be sung,
- May God bless and keep you always, may you stay forever young.

Play therapy

Play therapy can be helpful for children who are experiencing emotional or behavioural difficulties or coping with something tough at home or in school. Children can't always engage in traditional forms of counselling or 'talk therapy' but play can give them a way to work out their difficulties in a safe and age-appropriate way. We have recently moved our play therapy service into a new space in St Andrew's Resource Centre. The new children's therapy room is designed to be welcoming, cosy and child-friendly and provides lots of tools that children can use to express themselves and to calm their bodies and minds. Here are some photos from our lovely new space.

Speech and Language Therapy

Communication, especially with neurodiverse children, starts with genuine *connection* with the child. It is important to meet a child exactly where they are in the moment. This might mean dropping ideas of what we would like to 'teach' the child or how we would like them to learn or communicate. This might mean using no language but simply giving the child's body what it needs.

Speech and Language Therapy with neurodiverse children involves the parent and SLT working together to identify the things that support connection with the child.



D CALAFORT ÁTHA CLIATH Tolka Estuary Greenway Officially Opens to the Public

Minister James Lawless launches new section of the Dublin Coastal Trail, offering never-before-seen views across Dublin Bay.

Minister of State James Lawless TD has today launched the Dublin Port Tolka Estuary Greenway, a new shared cycling and pedestrian route which joins East Point Business Park to the Ferry Terminals and runs along the perimeter shelter and nesting sites for birdlife, pollinators, and other insects.

The Dublin Port Tolka Estuary Greenway also preserves and reinterprets the port's rich history. Seating at the Greenway's Discovery Points

of northern port lands reclaimed from the sea in the 1970s.

Developed by the Dublin Port Company, the Tolka Estuary Greenway forms part of Fáilte Ireland's Dublin Coastal Trail which runs from Skerries in the north to Killiney in the south. The trail, which highlights Dublin's maiestic coastline. is dotted with adventures and now proudly includes the port's Greenway. On this new

from the Alexandra Basin dating back to the 19th century. These granite pieces were recovered under the first phase of Dublin Port's Masterplan 2040. Only a short distance from Clontarf, cyclists and pedestrians can access the Greenway at its EastPoint **Business Park** entrance. a short

in the heart of the busy port, cyclists and pedestrians can take in stunning new views of Dublin Bay and hear calls of the migratory birds that call the port home throughout the year, including Brent Geese, Bar-Tailed Godwits and Common and Arctic Terns.

A collection of mature Pine, Willow and Sycamore trees are preserved along the route, which alongside additional planting of over 200 large trees and over 5,000 smaller woodland trees and native wildflowers have created new Terminal 2 building operated by Stena Line, in close proximity to the Terminal 1 building operated by Irish Ferries and Isle of Man Ferries.

Refreshments with K Coffee, a variety of food options, as well as ATM, showers, and toilet facilities, are available at the Circle K Dublin Port service station accessible midway through the route via Promenade Road. Equipped with a specialist lighting system to consider wildlife, the Greenway will also have call points scattered along the route. Setting off from the EastPoint entrance, users of the Dublin Port Tolka Estuary Greenway travel through a woodland corridor. The expanse of the Bay opens up to cyclists at the first of the Greenway's three 'Discovery Points'. These observation platforms reveal breathtaking views across Dublin Bay that have never been accessible to the public before.

At each Discovery Point, interpretive panels give context to the heritage and history of Dublin as a port city. The first Discovery Point faces out toward Clontarf, where Brian Boru fought the momentous 1014 Battle of Clontarf and defeated link the Port to Athlone via the Royal Canal and Clontarf Greenways in Q2 2025, when works are completed on Phase 3 of the Royal Canal Greenway.

A ceremony today marked the official opening of Phase One of the Dublin Port Tolka Estuary Greenway, with a further phase to follow as the port is developed. It will also be linked to the Liffey through the Liffey-Tolka Project, which received planning approval in 2023. This marks a milestone achievement in the delivery of Dublin Port's Masterplan 2040 to maximise the potential of existing port lands and integrate the

the Viking and Leinster armies. Heading south towards Promenade Road, visitors to the second Discovery Point can look out over Dublin Bay, where over 300 recorded shipwrecks lie beneath the waves, waiting to be discovered. Panels at this point offer insight into the toil and characteristic humour of the dockers, just a stone's throw from the shipyards where they worked and where a busy



hub of economic activity thrives today.

Continuing down Promenade Road to 'Discovery Point 3', visitors can catch a glimpse of the hardworking heart of the port, as ships arrive and depart, and take in a 270-degree view of Dublin Bay out to the Irish Sea.

The journey doesn't end there – the Dublin Port Tolka Estuary Greenway is a certified section of the 'Eurovelo 2 Capitals Route', a network of long-distance cycling routes developed by the European Cyclists' Federation (https://en.eurovelo.com/). This 5,000km route spans seven countries, six capital cities and two European seas. To the west, the Greenway will port and the city and the project represents an investment in the city of Dublin for generations to come.

Building the Greenway

An integral part of Dublin Port's Masterplan, first published in 2012, is the delivery of Port-City integration. The Greenway development along the northern perimeter of the Port Estate is a key project delivering on this objective. In 2021 design began for the new Greenway under the direction of the Dublin Port Capital Projects Team and ably supported by specialist consultants ROD Consulting Engineers, Darmody Architecture and Austen Associates Landscapes. Following an extensive design phase including local community and key stakeholder engagement, works began in summer 2023 following the appointment of Wills Bros Ltd. Over the following fifteen months, the project team worked tirelessly to deliver the vision and guality standards expected for this prestigious project.

The scheme comprised various engineering and architectural packages including coastal protection works, combined active travel path, three unique Discovery Points, specialist lighting system, extensive soft landscaping, various public realm and interpretation fixtures.
