After careful reflection on what the Centre needs for the future and an extensive recruitment process, Catherine Byrne began her new role as executive director of the Centre on 1 May. Catherine has been a key member of the team for the past 10 years, collaborating closely with John Fitzsimons on many key developments. Catherine brings that experience and great energy and ambition for the Centre to her new role and has received the full support of the whole Centre family.

It's hard to believe, but we marked the first anniversary of the death of our beloved John Fitzsimons on 21 June. We remembered him in the Centre and with his family at the anniversary Mass in St. Andrew's. He is missed every day, but we are confident that he is with us in spirit and supportive of the work being done to bring the Centre into the next chapter of its story.

A hugely successful South Docks Festival, summer projects for young and old alike, graduation from the childcare centre and many graduations from the construction skills programme – all were moments of significance and celebration. The Centre is now working on plans for a further expansion of the education and training hub, a further development of our home care and daycare services and a new design for the entrance and reception area of the building.

All this is so positive but it doesn't take from the fact that there have been difficult days for many members of the community over these last few months. Bereavement and sickness and the continuing housing crisis weigh heavily on many families in our area. Our aim is to be here for them in the short term and in the long-term, to offer support and stand in solidarity. As we look across our world where so many victims of war struggle to survive, we can see clearly the importance of a culture that recognises and protects the dignity of every person. Strong communities and strong voluntary organisations like St. Andrew's are an important part of keeping such a culture alive. For the Centre, our culture and our values are deeply rooted in a vision of humanity as brothers and sisters, children of the one Creator who promises to be with us as we stand together in service and hope.

EDUCATION & TRAINING HUB



The Junction Pearse Street

One of the newer services that St. Andrew's Resource Centre offers to the community is our Education and Training Hub located in the Junction at the corner of Pearse Street and Macken Street.

The HUB offers a range of services some of them large projects, others tailored to meet the needs of individuals. Essentially a gateway to all services in St. Andrews the HUB is open from 9.00 – 5.00 Monday to Friday. In-house the project provides access to Guidance and Education services, access to training courses and supports for college and PLC students there is also a welfare rights service that can help anyone who needs it, delivered quietly and confidentially.

In addition, the Hub runs several larger projects, the largest of which is the construction skills

program located in Dublin Port. This project delivered by St. Andrews in Partnership with Dublin Port and the National Construction Skills center has been responsible for training very nearly 3000 people since its inception and is projected to train 1100 people in 2025 alone. What do we train?

Construction Skills Course (15 days)

- Overview of construction industry roles and responsibilities
- Safety protocols and regulations
- Issue and use of PPE
- Basic tools and equipment usage
- Safe Pass
- Manual Handling
- Working at heights
- MEWP
- Abrasive Wheels

- Basic Block Laying (Lvl 3)
- Basic Carpentry (Lvl 3)
- Basic Plumbing (Lvl 3)

Retrofitting Techniques (10 days)

- Understanding energy-efficient upgrades
- Retrofitting for insulation, ventilation, and lighting
- Practical installation of materials air tightness and insulation (LvI 4)

The Hub also organises a short cleaning skills course and twice a year a pre apprenticeship course that aims to support those who are seeking to learn a trade.



Can I use the services of the HUB?

Absolutely yes, we organise all services for those that need them, and we have no artificial barriers, sometimes there may be blocks to some services for reasons beyond our control, but we do all we can to find a way around these. How to access the service: We provide many access routes either in person or by telephone. 





EILEEN DUNNE, Pearse Square resident, shares with us an Italian recipe inspired by the Irish connection to the invention of radio!

I am standing on the western tip where Guglielmo Giovanni Marconi traversed the ocean with wireless waves, transcending space to Grace Bay in Nova Scotia. The land at my back ferments, imbued with the prints of those who were. The survivors, those who emigrated, gasping for an ordinary life; to sit at a table, to eat, to drink and reminisce, to indulge in the most ordinary of things. And I wonder about what Marconi ate during his travels in Ireland.

Images unfold of a young Marconi travelling through Connemara with stout jars of olives stored in a great big Italian trunk. Possibly *La Bella Cerignola*, the loveliest of olives, mouthfuls of juicy green bites. He was born in Bologna to an Italian father and Irish mother, Annie Jameson from Cappoquin. Here, in this place, everything seems slotted with purpose through the expanse of time.

Recipes are storytellers, each ingredient a treasure, a custodian of terrain and identity, a societal indicator, historical notches that morph and mould the landscape. A humble olive encapsulates a history of sustenance, culture, religion. An outreach of peace.

Marconi's native Bologna is renowned for flatbreads, ragú and tortellini (small rings of pasta filled with meats and parmigiano in a meat broth). And while illusions of Marconi carrying olives from his native Italy to Ireland is nothing other than a romantic tale, *Ragú alla Bolognese* marries perfectly with Irish culture; a hearty and satisfying pasta dish perfect for family dinners and sharing with friends.

RECIPE

Ragù all Bolgnese (serves 5/6)

Ilngredients:

- 500g of dried pasta such as rigatoni
- 200g of grated parmesan cheese
- 500g of quality minced beef
- 200 g of quality minced pork
- (or 700 g of minced beef only)
- 150g of diced pancetta
- 2 tins of plum tomatoes (300g each)
- 2 large ripe beef tomatoes, chopped
- 1 diced medium carrot
- 1 diced stick of celery
- 1 diced large onion
- 2 bay leaves
- Sprig of rosemary
- Fresh basil
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Extra virgin olive oil
- 1 glass of red wine

Method:

- 1. In a heavy based saucepan sauté the pancetta in a little oil until crisp. Remove from the pan with a slotted spoon and set aside.
- 2. In a large wide based saucepan sauté the onion, celery and carrot in 5 tablespoons of extra virgin olive oil, over a low heat for 5 minutes.

- Add the beef and pork mince and stir until the meat turns a nice deep pink colour but avoid browning the meat.
- 4. Pour in the red wine and increase the heat momentarily to cook off the alcohol and then reduce the heat.
- 5. Add the tinned and fresh tomatoes and stir.
- 6. Fold in the pancetta and 150ml of water.
- 7. Tie your fresh herbs together to create a bouquet garni and add to the pot
- 8. Cover and simmer for 1½ to 2 hours over a low heat.
- 9. Salt and pepper to your taste.
- 10. Check the sauce regularly, stir and blend the tomatoes using a wooden spoon.
- 11. Add water should your ragu tend to dry.
- 12. When the ragù is ready, remove from the heat and leave to rest.
- 13. Cook the pasta in a large pot of boiling salted water according to the instructions on the packet. Strain the pasta and add to the ragù saucepan and sprinkle with plenty of grated parmigiano and serve immediately.



Speech and Language Therapy

Communication, especially with neurodiverse children, starts with genuine *connection* with the child. It is important to meet a child exactly where they are in the moment. This might mean dropping ideas of what we would like to 'teach' the child or how we would like them to learn or communicate. This might mean using no language but simply giving the child's body what it needs.



Speech and Language Therapy with neurodiverse children involves the parent and SLT working together to identify the things that support connection with the child.

WHAT HAPPENED TO JOHN KENNEDY

Within Saint Andrews Resource Centre there is a collection of Roll Books dating back to 1897 listing pupils who attended here when the building was a boy's national school. One of these roll books covers the period 1904 – 1914 and recorded therein is a pupil named John Kennedy, Student Number 247, 13 Denzille Street

On page 48 of the roll book written in the margin is one word "DEAD". The year was 1906, John had been absent for some time prior to his death.

Earlier entries in the roll book gave two addresses the family had lived at in 1906

40 Upper Erne Street

13 Denzille Street

As there was no further information the heritage group undertook the task of finding out, What happened to John?

We began by looking up the Kennedy Family on the 1901 Census and found they were living at the 183.2 Townsend Street.

Parents

John (30) Gas Laborer Read&Write R/C Thomasina (28) Wife Read&Write R/C

Two Daughters

Essie (4) Scholar Cannot Read R/C Mary (1) Infant



One Son

John William (6) Scholar Cannot Read R/C

One Brother In Law

John Clarke (30) Coal Laborer Read&Write R/C

John Joseph Kennedy from 23 Clarence Place had married Thomasina Clarke from 2 Queens Terrace in Saint Andrew's Church, in the April of 1894.

Aware that John had died in the 1906 we tried to look up the remainder of his family on the 1911 Census. We could find no trace of the family in this area so we looked at all of Dublin, with no luck, then all of Ireland, with the same result.

Having failed to trace the Kennedy family in 1911 we returned to the search for John.

We looked up a register of Deaths in Dublin and found.

John William Kennedy, 13 Denzille Street died of Tuberculosis in Harolds Cross Hospice on 19th November 1906. He was 13 years of Age. Then the full tragic trail of events began to unfold. On that register we also found.

His Sister

Essie Kennedy, died 27th March 1902, Aged 5 years at 183 Townsend Street.

His Mother

Thomasina Kennedy, died 8th March 1906, aged 34 at 40 Upper Erne Street.

Himself

John William Kennedy, died 19th November 1906, Aged 13 at Harolds Cross Hospice.

His Father

John Joseph Kennedy, died 25th December, Aged 40 at the South Dublin Union Workhouse "an address of 3 Upper Erne Street is shown".

The only member of the family who did not appear on the register was Mary, who was now an orphan.

Mary Martha Kennedy on the 1911 Census. The closest match we found was a Mary Kennedt aged 15, living at Goldenbridge Industrial School, Kilmainham.

John Clarke "The Brother in law" is shown on the 1911 Census laiving as a boarder at 43.1 Queens Square. He was single.

Just to give some insight into how the family lived we looked at the five addresses we had for them.

In 1899 the year Mary was born the family lived at 11 Asylum Yard.

The 1901 Census shows 11 Asylum Yard had two rooms there would have been five people living in two rooms.

The family then moved to 183 Townsend Street this is the address where Essie died 27/03/190.

The 1901 Census shows there were four families living there:

Edward Connor	2 rooms	3 people
John Kennedy	1 room	6 people
Mary Burke	1 room	6 people
Thomas Burton	1 room	6 people
21 People in 5 rooms		

The family then moved to 40 Upper Erne Street
This is the address where Thomasina died 08/03/1906.

The 1901 Census shows five families in the house 9 people in 6 rooms.

They then moved to 13 Denzille Street, This is the address given on John's death register 19/11/1906.


The 1901 Census shows eight families in the house. 41 people in 10 rooms.

The last address we have 3 Upper Erne Street from the father's death register 25th December 1910.

The 1901 Census shows 10 families in the house. 40 people in 12 Rooms.

We set out to find out what happened to John and ended up wondering what happened to Mary. Alas that remains a mystery of history. At least for now.

Blades Plaque unveiling. This plaque commemorates the fact that Ringsend band the Blades, played their very first gig in the CYMS Hall in 1977. There was a re-enactment of this event on the night and Q & A with the

surviving 5 members of the band.

In December, there was a nice Christmas present for the people of South Lotts in the form of the painting of the planters on South Lotts Road. The Society co operated with the residents association, SLRA in sourcing artist John O'Flynn who did a spectacular job in recreating the area's industrial heritage.

2025 got off to a start with the unveiling of a plaque to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the opening the Rinn / Regal Cinema in Fitzwilliam St. Abundant Grace Christian Assembly very kindly funded the plaque and the production of a commemorative booklet to mark the occasion. It was fantastic to see so many Regal veterans in attendance. Pastor Sharon will host a matinee this November, screening the last film ever shown 'Bird Man of Alcatraz'.

At Easter there was a 1916 walking tour followed by a unique exhibition of veteran Seamus Grace's memorabilia on display at RICC. This was followed soon afterwards by a slideshow hosted by Brendan Wicks.

BLOOMSDAY FESTIVAL 2025

Once again our flagship event was a massive success. Building on the day that James and Nora had their first date in Ringsend Park on that world famous day in 1904, we had an unprecedented 9 events over 5 days. Kicking off the festivities with the Writers' Adventure on Thursday, followed on Friday by a Tour of St Mattew's Church & Graveyard presented by Trevor James.

Saturday began with a lecture "Ringsend 1904" in the Library. Immediately afterwards, a Joycean walk of the area took place. Severe weather conditions meant that the planned outdoor Ballad Fest had to be relocated indoors to the Library.

On Sunday, Dublin Bay Cruises very generously provided the St Brigid and took 96 invitees on a trip into the Bay. A sincere thank to Eugene, Eddie and the crew. The passengers were so delighted. We would also like to thank Richie Saunders and Cormac Lowth who gave history talks. Sea shanties were sung by the Pullovers, then it was back to RICC for a light breakfast.

Bloomsday itself fell on Monday and commenced with a procession featuring a horse and carriage with James and Nora aboard. Leaving Ringsend Church, passing through Strasbourg Terrace and over to the park bench plaque where it is envisaged the young couple began their lifelong love affair. Thanks to Mary and Philip

The centre piece of our festival was of course our annual brunch in the Community Centre which drew our biggest crowd to date. Delicious food accompanied by excellent music brought the Festival to a tremendous finale. A huge thanks to Lorraine and staff of RICC for the brilliant organisation. As an added bonus, an unique collection of the paintings of the 19 Dublin homes which Joyce lived in were kindly loaned to the Society by artist Charles Hulgraine. These were on display in the Centre for 2 weeks coinciding with the festivities. Looking forward to an even bigger and better 2026 Bloomsday!

Monuments Projects in the works – A 3 Lamped Monument to commemorate 1916 heroes – Patrick Whelan, George Reynolds and The O'Rahilly, A Shane MacGowan Statue, a Dockers Monument and a Commemorative Street Clock to Sean Moore TD.

An integral part of the Society's ethos is the preservation and protection of what remains our area's rich history in all it's facets. The Crazy World Exchange group and our Intercultural committee were the brains behind the project. As a follow up to the launch the Douglas Hyde Gallery has produced a video focusing on the participants and the launch. The gallery showed the video on a giant screen at the entrance to Trinity college on Nassau St.
- 150 young people attended our Y.O.L.O. workshops.
- Currently running a dance project with local and Ukrainian young people.
- Young people from our Now and Then project visited 14 Henrietta St with the seniors from Greenore. We hosted the seniors in our Trinity space "The Cave" This project is a huge success.
- 15 young people from Cool Kids took part in a 3 day residential in Liverpool with our partners The Shewsey Youth project in Liverpool
- 37 young people were taken to Larch Hill Scout centre for a 3-day Easter residential.
- A recent collaboration with our family support department team has resulted in a new program being delivered to over 40 young girls. "The Period Initiative" has been warmly welcomed by all.
- The Heart of Us project and Amy Lawless one of our young people, won a group and individual award respectively at the Dublin South Central Garda awards. These were presented in City Hall.
- A packed 2-week summer project happened in July.
- A Men's Health/Wellness week in conjunction with our family support department was a great success.
- A Financial wellbeing session was held in Bank of Ireland with The Zone youth group. The group also did a lot of work around healthy eating looking at simple nutritious meals on a budget. Smoothies were a big fav....
- 12 young people from The Good Gang and The Junior Squad took part in 2 months of dance workshops culminating in their participation in the St Patrick's Day parade, along with 9 other Dublin youth projects, organised by CDYS.

- We hosted the Dublin South Central District, Garda Youth Awards launch
- Our Respect youth group looked at the issue of homelessness in Dublin and the work being done to support homeless people in the city. They ran a number of fundraisers and raised funds for the Peter McVerry trust.

- Our International youth groups went to Finland and Spain for 2 weeklong exchange programmes,
