#### DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

The directors present their annual report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2019.

Directors' responsibilities statement

The directors are responsible for preparing the Directors' report and the financial statements in accordance with Irish law and regulations.

Irish company law requires the directors to prepare the financial statements for each financial year. Under the law, the directors have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with the Companies Act 2014 and Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland'.

Under company law, the directors must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied they give a true and fair view of the assets, liabilities and financial position of the Company as at the financial year end date, of the profit or loss for that financial year and otherwise comply with the Companies Act 2014.

In preparing these financial statements, the directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies for the Company's financial statements and then apply them consistently;
- make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether the financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, identify those standards, and note the effect and the reasons for any material departure from those standards; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Company will continue in business.

Principal activities

St. Andrew's History

St Andrew's Resource Centre Limited is located in Pearse Street in the former National School Building in Dublin's South East Inner City, Built in 1895 the School catered for the boys of Westland Row Parish, Over 4500 children were attending National Schools in the area at this time. The School closed its doors in 1976 due to falling numbers.

Our Service commenced in 1973 in Westland Row on a very small scale. We are now approaching 50 years providing social services to the parishes of Westland Row and City Quay.

St Andrew's school building was made available in 1985 to the Social Service Council by the Archdiocese to be redeveloped as a Resource Centre for the Westland Row/City Quay parishes. The building was totally returbished and formally opened on 16th June 1989. The Centre is operated and managed by a limited company with charitable status.

From the beginning the Centre was committed to core principles which continue to motivate us 46 years on

- A holistic view of the needs of people and of the community, across all stages of the life-cycle;
- A joined up approach to planning, organizing and delivering services to make them as accessible and
  effective as possible;
- A determination to develop its capacity and Programmes to meet the changing needs of the community it serves;
- A commitment to high standards of professionalism and good practice in its activities;
- A philosophy of investing in its team, both staff and volunteers, to develop their capacity and skills to meet the highest standards of performance;
- A firm commitment to the principles of community development and advocacy for the needs and rights
  of the local community and
- A philosophy of positive engagement and partnership with statutory agencies, other community and voluntary bodies and the business community in developing its services and addressing the needs of the community.

St. Andrew's Resource Centre is the main focus for community activities in the South East Inner City of Dublin. The Centre offers support services and development opportunities to Individuals and to families at all stages of the life cycle: childcare provision; youth Programmes (including grinds facilities / exam preparation / homework and after schools assistance), outreach Programmes; adult education Programmes (both day and evening); parenting and young mothers' Programmes, Fitness Programmes, Parent and Baby programme, Autism Support programme, Family Support, employment and training opportunities for the long term unemployed; and enterprise service, employment preparation and placement services; C.E. placement and training; home help services for the elderly and families under stress; meals on wheels; men's gardening project, welfare rights and advice service; a Day Centre for the elderly; a training room to help local people develop their IT skills; a cyber café, again for local use and local heritage project. We also run a fully equipped gym on behalf of Dublin City Council hosting a full range of adult and children's fitness Programmes.

The Centre is strongly committed to community development. It provides information on local issues and developments, in particular through publication of a community magazine "The New Link", which is delivered free to over 3,500 homes in the area.

The Centre provides a location for networking of local organisations and people, It liaises closely with local public representatives and the representatives of Dublin City Council, Dublin Development Authority, MABS, Citizens Information Services, Drugs Task Force, Primary Health Care, Social Work Services, Tusla, Department of Social Protection, CDYSB, HSE and other relevant bodies.

St. Andrew's Resource Centre receives funding from a variety of public agencies for the delivery of services under contract or service level agreement. The linking of these various activities in one centre generates economies of scale, while the hollstic approach makes for greater effectiveness.

St. Andrew's have always enjoyed financial support from the community and from local businesses, to develop new activities and to supplement public funding. This is now vital to enable us to maintain our core services. We greatly value this support and the partnerships which give rise to this financial support. We are always anxious to explain our vision and to invite new partners to share in this work of supporting the community at the heart of the city.

#### Our Vision

The vision of St Andrew's is that the Centre will remain at the heart of the community of Westland Row and City Quay, as a trusted resource that is effective in enabling the community to remain confident in its identity, assertive in pursuing its needs in a challenging period, dynamic and generous in solidarity across its members and welcoming to newcomers, and that in doing so, St Andrews will be respected by its statutory partners and attract increased private sector support

#### Our Mission

The mission of St Andrew's is to deliver high quality, creative and holistic responses to the needs of families and individuals in the community of Westland Row and City Quay and to others who avail of the services, so as to enable them to live fulfilled and autonomous lives with the highest possible levels of wellbeing - in terms of health, employment, relationships, mental, social and spiritual development.

#### Service Overview 2019

In line with its philosophy of joined-up services, the Centre operates a broad range of Programmes to cater for needs right across the life-cycle.

#### Older People

#### Day Centre

St Andrew's Senior care provides numerous services to those aged 65 and over. Our Day Centre open 5 days per week offering a 3 course lunch to 40 people each day. We also deliver hot meals to up to 30 clients who are unable to attend due to progressive illness and vulnerability. This meal delivery is an opportunity to check daily that the person is doing well. There are social activities 5 days per week offering bingo, line dancing, relaxation, movie days, flower arranging and many social and celebratory occasions. We also host a community breakfast on Fridays where all staff, clients and visitors mix freely

#### Home Help Sarvice

42 Fetac accredited home support staff provide services aimed at keeping the person living in their own home for as long as possible. We carry out household supports when maintaining cleanliness, bed linen and faundry become a challenge. Our carers also shower, bathe, dress and prepare food for clients with higher needs getting them ready to face the day ahead and then returning for lunch and night visits.

#### Young People

Talk About Youth Service

The Talk About Youth Service provides a professional youth work service to about 300 young people aged 10 to 24 years of age in the catchment area of City Quay and Westland Row parishes. Educational and recreational programmes are designed to enhance the personal and social development of young people. They are empowered to become critical thinkers, to build on their self-esteem, develop social skills, to take responsibility for shaping their own lives and to become positive role models in their community. Programmes offer the young people worthwhile and challenging new experiences while learning new skills and gaining knowledge. Our work is driven by the needs of the young people and is in keeping with the National Youth strategy and the National Outcomes.

Programmes delivered include Health promotion, Life skills, I.T., Youth Arts, International Exchanges, intercultural and Development Education, Youth Employability, Outdoor Education, RSE, LGBTI +, Outreach, Seasonal programmes and a host of others.

The service also supports a number of voluntary clubs and their volunteers, who work with those aged 4 to 10. We work closely with local schools, Gardal, community groups, funders, other youth services, specialist organisations and national bodies.

Highlights of the year included:

- YOLO (YOU ONLY LIVE ONCE) (Drug Education and RSE) programmes were delivered to 200 young people.
- International Exchanges included; Erasmus+ trip to Kokkola in Finland, Causeway trip with our friends from England and Wales to Snowdonia adventure centre, Erasmus + trip to Croatia, with Norway, Croatia and Ireland and Erasmus + Dublin 19 home exchange with 5 European countries. 36 young people from Pearse street took part in these exchanges.
- Inbetweenagers and Youth 21 weekend trip to the Cavan adventure center, with 44 young people.
- The young people delivered Christmas presents to the Old folks in our community.
- Helping some of the families in need get over Christmas with a smile.
- We ran "One Good Adult" training with Jigsaw for 12 adults from the community.
- We hosted 2 youth workers from Indianapolis for 2 days.
- We launched "Impact Plus" research project in the centre looking at the impact of international exchanges on young people. It was the first report of its kind in Europe.
- Consultations were held with DCYA reviewing and consulting on the new UBU funding guidelines.
- 12 young people took part in our Life Time Tours, acollaboration with Pearse Street Community Garda.
- 14 young people completed a kayaking course courtesy of Waterways Ireland.
- 20 young people participated in a survey carried out by C.A.N. looking at living conditions in Pearse House flats.
- 60 of our young people availed of our summer project.
- At Christmas we brought 120 young people and some parents to the Olympia panto.
- Our Intercultural group participated in European youlh week, where they explored how young people can explore how they can influence decision making and be active in society.
- Our Bikers group, which is made up of 5 young boys who are regarded as vulnerable, due to their antisocial behaviour, engaged in basic MMA and fitness training with John Kavanagh, Ireland's leading MMA trainer.
- Our girl talk group is made up of young girls from the ages of 10 to 16, most of whom have issues
  around anxiety, self image, self esteem and problematic home life. They engage with us every week
  and their highlight was a residential in the Cavan centre, where they did some personal development
  work, team building and planted a tree in memory of family who have passed away.
- The Lir theatre company and the Douglas Hyde gallery established youth arts projects with us.
- Up to 300 young people engaged with us through our youth groups, schools work and specialist areas like LGBT1+, International programmes and Intercultural work.
- 7 of our participants received their Gaisce Silver awards.

Voluntary Tuition Programme

We have 218 children receiving one to one grinds as well as Art, Drama, Irish club and group Orals in preparation for the Junior/Leaving cert exams. This invaluable support to local children is a partnership between St. Andrew's, local schools and students of TCD who volunteer for these weekly sessions. There are exciting plans to develop this programme.

#### Childcare

The enthusiastic and highly qualified staff of St. Andrew's Childcare Centre provide full-time and part-time day care services for 44 children aged 2 years to school going age. We also provide an Afterschool service.

Children are offered a wide variety of activities which cater for each child's individual needs. Staff encourage the children to express their own thoughts and feelings in order to aid them in their social, emotional and language development. Children are encouraged to experiment with new activities, explore the creative possibilities of arts and crafts, develop ideas and communicate them freely. The cost of places is supported through CCS CCSP and ECCE. We have a purpose built outdoor area and a large indoor area for children to play in every day. We provide Aistear and the Siolta Standard framework curriculum.

#### Families

All of the activities at St Andrew's cater - one way or another - for local families in all the diversity of their situations and needs. The holistic and integrated approach to service delivery embodies the concept of family support.

St Andrew's is funded for this role as a Family Resource Centre by Tusia. This core funding is levered by the Centre to attract complementary funding, both public and private.

Family Support Service

The Family Support Service provides services to individuals and families either one to one or in groups. Referrals are received from individuals, family members, schools, social work, psychlatric services and other specialist services as appropriate. Parenting Programmes, parent and baby programmes, supports for parents of children with special needs and positive health programmes are facilitated through the year.

The Family Support Service also processes the Garda Vetting for the Centre and its volunteers and is responsible for the Speak data recording system reporting all our activities to Tusla.

Therapeutic Service

St Andrews provides low cost and free counselling and psychotherapy for men, women and children through its different counselling services. We have two adult Therapists and three child Therapists, an Art Psychotherapists and two Play therapists working with the younger children. We provide this support to children both in St Andrews and on site in three local schools. This service is fully funded by Tusia and caters for children from two years to eighteen years and for adults.

Family Support Group Work

The Migrant Parent Support Group was run again in spring 2019 with 20 parents – we used literature as a way of telling the stories of the Migrant parents and supporting their issues. One parenting Course was delivered with 6 parents in attendance. Mindful Mondays started in 2019 providing a relief for stress during lunch time for

2019 was a very eventful year for family support, there have been a number of new projects; Kinship Care Ireland – working in collaboration with other interested parties to establish a support network for families who are caring for a child. We have also become involved in the Prevention and Early Intervention Network steering committee, arranging conferences, meetings and producing reports and studies of evidence informed work in this area.

**Employment Service** 

St Andrew's continues to deliver the Local Employment service branded as Eastside + Docklands Local Employment service. This service delivers a professionally staffed service located in both St. Andrew's Resource Centre and in the ICRG in the north inner city and training services in Dublin Port. . The Centre offers information, advice and support to unemployed people to enable them to develop the skills and experience they need for the jobs market.

In the past year the service has continued its development of its construction skills project located in Dublin Port that is designed to target very long term unemployed men and deliver training to them. The project is driven by the labour market demand of the many construction sites in the Docklands and beyond. So far the course has trained over 200 candidates across over 20 courses our most recent report is available. The course has successfully placed clients that are most distant from the workforce including a number of homeless men.

In addition to the construction skills course the following outcomes were delivered in 2019 a total of 170 clients into work and 319 other client progressions including training.

Job Initiative

We employ 18 older people with long-established employment difficulties under the Job initiative Programme. These people are part of the core team working to operate the Centre and a funded by the Department of Social Protection. This year the Jobs Initiative project continued to work now organised into small teams with particular areas of expertise and a series of team meetings have been held to develop the collegial approach. Numbers on this vital team continue to dwindle due to retirement which is a concern to team members who are being asked to do more and management who have no replacement for these vital community workers.

The service aims to guide and support people through the often complex process of establishing and securing their entitlements. The service will also act as an advocate for people in this process, as appropriate.

The service works closely with the other programmes in the Centre so that initial contact with one service can result in an improvement in a family's overall circumstances.

470 people attended our Welfare Rights & Information Service which provided information, advice and advocacy

Our facility, The Junction, has been used to assist job seekers develop business ideas and plans and support their start up enterprises. Since 2017 that function was moved into the main building and the Junction repurposed to provide a range of services. During the year we have organised a mother and baby project in the centre and a number of our adult education projects were based in the Junction including art and sewing skills.

. Towards the end of 2017 a new food service located in the Junction was developed by the St. Vincent De Paul Society, which deals with over 150 people on a weekly basis. Our Art classes, organised with the original support of Dublin Port, are also located in the Junction. In the evening time the Junction is available to local, young people as a non-structured gathering space.

The Centre operates a dedicated IT training Centre where expert tuition and a well-equipped facility provide a resource for developing IT skills at all levels and for all age groups.

In the past year, the Centre has provided training to those without any IT skills whatsoever. We ran courses titled Equal Skills, which deals with the very basics of identifying hardware such as the mouse and identifying the various keys on the keyboard, moving on to typing skills and a general awareness of using email and the Internet for education and entertainment. The other certified training provided was ECDL, (European Computer Driving Licence). We ran this course mainly as a follow up to the Equal Skills course. No one is precluded from

doing either of the courses mentioned

All participants are encouraged to use the excellent Cyber Café resource downstairs as a way of consolidating their newfound skills.

The youth office avail of the training room especially regarding the trips they take with their participants on the International Exchange Programmes where the facility is well suited with fast broadband and if necessary webcams. The training room is available to rent and was rented to a number of organisations including the Simon Community who provided training to their staff.

Last but not least, we provided training to our 'Silver Surfers', a computer class for people especially from the local area (but not necessarily so) who may have missed out on the IT revolution. They have one training session per week plus another session where they practice their skills and have an opportunity to pass on their skills to others. This is our longest running programme of which we are very proud.

Community Employment Programme

The Centre employs up to 95 people under the Community Employment Programme funded by the Department of Social Protection. This programme is operated from St Andrew's Community Employment office and is managed by a team of people trained in the care and training of long term unemployed people.

The programme has grown over the years and we have expanded into a large number of partner voluntary and community bodies. Participants receive valuable work experience, while engaging in training to develop useful skills. They are supported to seek open employment and, in the process, make a valuable contribution to the community through their work effort.

The value of this Programme is reflected in the significant progression of participants. In the last year 28 people finished and 7 of them went on to full employment. We ran 17 different training courses with 81 people taking part.

#### Adult Education

We had 5 classes running through 2019

Creative Writing class Tuesday's 10-12pm 5-8 students

It's an easy fun-with-English class without using the word literacy. You can bring along artefacts, personal memorabilia, old photographs, books, poetry, and stories of old! Stories of newl

Sewing class Wednesday morning's 10-12pm very popular class 8-10 students Our new tutor Arron is a dress designer and the class is thriving.

Digital Media class Wednesday's 2-4pm 8-10 students

Learning how to use your Smart Device phone, iPhone, IPad and Tablet, a very popular class.

Irish class Thursday's 10.30-12.30pm 13-18 students

Older people love this class and having fun with the Irish language.

Art class Friday's 10-12pm 10 students

We have a diverse number of students in this class, some have mild learning difficulties and are supported in their altendance, new people in the area who are referred from a social worker and people referred from the probation office as well as our local budding Artists.

3 out of 5 classes are now delivered in The Junction for access purposes as this is beneficial to those who have mobility issues.

#### Sport and Recreation

The Centre operates the Sport and Recreation Centre on South Gloucoster Street on behalf of Dublin City Council. The Sports centre celebrated its 10th Anniversary in 2019. Commercial users from the local business community subsidize its use by the community, including extensive use by local schools without their own sports facilities. This is an example of a successful social enterprise made possible by a creative partnership with an Innovative public service.

Gloucester Street Sports Centre currently employs 3 permanent Staff. We also currently have seven staff employed through the Community Employment scheme in various roles throughout the centre.

Gloucester St works closely with the local schools on a daily basis, both primaries and secondaries. Our programme with them includes activities to include their gross motor skills, social and teambuilding skills. We had great success yet again this year with our Operation Transformation and Healthy Cooking on a Budget.

Gloucester Street is also running an on-going teenage girls programme. This programme increased from 2 days in 2017 to 4 days in 2019 and now operates Monday to Thursday from 3pm - 4.00pm in conjunction with

The Centre is hired out daily by local business for activities such as football, basketball, volleyball, badminton, Pilates and Zumba. Volleyball Ireland now use the Centre on a weekly basis as their Dublin City Centre Base for training for the 2018-2019 season. National College of Ireland and YMCA for their 2018-2019 seasons of sports activities. An average of 750-1,000 people use our facilities on a weekly basis in 2019.

Heritage

The Saint Andrew's Heritage Project is currently Liaising with Trinity College Dublin to digitise the old Saint Andrew's Roll Books and to have them available online for those interested in researching their Family History. The Roll Book Project began three years ago and is still a work in progress. Trinity College students have already gathered a number of names from the old roll-books and they are now available on an online database. The database work includes the years 1910-1916 and will eventually include 1895, the year St Andrew's National School was opened and continuing right up to the year the school was closed in 1976.

#### Community Development

The Centre's commitment to empowering the community for its own development has led it to support campaigns to highlight the needs of the area in respect of housing, education, amenities and employment. It engages closely with local public representatives and advocates for the community with a variety of public agencies. The Centre is represented on the Dublin Docklands Consultative forum.

The Centre has long enjoyed a positive relationship with the local business community, encouraging them to see themselves as stakeholders in a vibrant and confident local community. With the dramatic changes brought about by redevelopment of the area, we are seeking to extend this relationship to the many new enterprises, large and small, which have arrived, through networks like the Docklands Business Forum. co-operates with like-minded organisations across the voluntary sector, especially in the inner city.

The Centre publishes a community magazine -- 'The New Link'- to promote communication and awareness across the community.

The Centre's facilities are made available for meetings and activities to local community organisations and to others catering to community needs, such as public representatives, FLAC, AA and SVP.

St Andrews as a Family Resource Centre

St Andrews has received core funding since 1990 from the Department of Social Welfare as it was, and subsequently from the Family Support Agency to support the core costs of the development and operation of the Centre. This core funding is now provided by Tusia funds to support administrative support and Programme staffing as well as some of the overheads for the operations of the Centre. In order to serve the families in the community to the appropriate standard, the building needs to be kept safe, and maintained to a very high standard, administered efficiently and have its finances controlled on a sound basis. Therefore, core funding is essential to enable the Centre to operate the range of activities and services to the community. This however, only forms a very small percentage of the overall funding requirements for St Andrew's Resource Centre to operate on a daily basis.

Our work has proved to be excellent value for money, with a substantial impact represented by the many positive results for local people, with special focus on the training, development and support of the most vulnerable in our community. We plan to continue to develop our services and supports to reach as many people as possible and to respond to the growing volume of demands from the local area, especially in light of the major new developments that have taken place and continue to be developed in our docklands community. Our services have been evolving in response to changing community needs as well as through reflection on our experience and analysis of our strengths and challenges. We continue to provide a cost-effective service to target groups that are challenging some of our traditional service provision.

The donations reflected in the accounts for 2019 include a donation of €120,000 allocated to the Resource Centre through Dublin City Council in the context of conditions of planning permission and pald by Cairn Homes. This exceptional donation has been allocated to the reserves in order to bring them to a more satisfactory level as required by the Code of Governance for Voluntary Organisations.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

#### General information

St Andrew's Resource Centre Limited is a private company limited by shares, incorporated in the Republic of Ireland. The Registered Office is 114/116 Pearse Street, Dublin 2, which is also the principal place of business of the company. The nature of the company's operations and its principal activities are set out in the Directors Report on pages 2 to 11.

#### 2. Accounting policies

# 2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland and Irish statute comprising of the Companies Act 2014.

The Company has voluntarily implemented the Statement of Standard Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP) where applicable as it has not yet been brought into legislation in the Republic of Ireland. The financial statements have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from SORP only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair' view will complying with the Companies Act 2014.

The preparation of financial statements in compliance with FRS 102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise judgment in applying the Company's accounting policies.

The following principal accounting policies have been applied:

#### 2.2 Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the historical cost convention modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is the Companies Act 2014 and FRS 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland.

## 2.3 Income

All income is recognised once the company has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donated services or facilities are recognised when the company has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use of the company of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), the general volunteer time of the Friends is not recognised and refer to the Trustees' Report for more information about their contribution.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the company which is the amount the company would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Income tax recoverable in relation to investment income is recognised at the time the investment income is receivable.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

#### 2.4 Exponditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the company. Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the company and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Charitable activities and Governance costs are costs incurred on the company's operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the company apportioned to charitable activities.

#### 2,5 Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

#### 2.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without penalty on notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value.

In the Statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents are shown net of bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the Company's cash management.

## 2.7 Financial Instruments

The Company only enters into basic financial instrument transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like trade and other debtors and creditors, toans from banks and other third parties, loans to related parties and investments in non-puttable ordinary shares.

#### 2,8 Creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other financial liabilities, including bank loans, are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

#### 2.9 Government grants

Grants are accounted under the accruals model as permitted by FRS 102 which is a departure from SORP. Grants relating to expenditure on tangible fixed assets are credited to the income and Expenditure Account at the same rate as the depreciation on the assets to which the grant relates. The deferred element of grants is included in creditors as deferred income.

Grants of a revenue nature are recognised in the Statement of financial activities in the same period as the related expenditure.

#### 2,10 Pensions

## Defined contribution pension plan

The Company operates a defined contribution plan for its employees. A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the Company pays fixed contributions into a separate entity. Once the contributions have been paid the Company has no further payment obligations.

The contributions are recognised as an expense in the Statement of comprehensive income when they fall due. Amounts not paid are shown in accruals as a liability in the Balance sheet. The assets of the plan are held separately from the Company in independently administered funds.

#### 2.11 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the directors in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the company for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the directors' report
