Major Edmund Butler is the second of eight men killed in action in World War 1 who we are remembering this year. These men were parishioners and memorial plaques located in the side corridor of St. Andrew's commemorate each of the eight.

Major Butler was born in Dublin in 1891 and died on 18th April, 1918 (aged 26). He had been wounded in action a week earlier at Messines and did not recover from his injuries. His unit was the 2nd Life Guards and he was attached to the 8th Battalion of the Gloucestershire Regiment. He is buried at Etaples Military Cemetery in France.

He was the son of John and Mary Butler of 40 Fitzwilliam Place. His father, John was a Wholesale Wine and Tea Merchant in the city. Sadly, the death of Major Butler was not the first tragedy to befall the family. Less than 6 months earlier in November, 1917, Edmund's younger brother, Lieutenant Leonard Butler, Royal Irish Fusiliers, had been killed in action in Flanders. He is buried at Croisilles Military Cemetery in France.

The Life Guards Regiment has a long history dating to the reign of Charles II, whose mounted bodyguard went into exile with the king before the Restoration in the seventeenth century. Later, they formed the front charging line of the Household Brigade at the battle of Waterloo in 1815. Early in 1918, the Life Guards gave up their horses and became machine gun battalions. After the Armistice they reverted to the titles 1st and 2nd Life Guards.

The author Vera Brittain is best known for her best-selling memoirs, Testament of Youth, recently adapted for the big screen. The man she was to marry, her brother and two of her closest male friends were all killed during World War 1. She witnessed the conflict herself first hand when she volunteered as an auxiliary nurse and tended wounded soldiers in France.

These are her words:

("Died of Wounds")

Because you died, I shall not rest again



'See, I Make All Things New!'

We all have a fascination with the new: the latest gadget, the newest brand, this summer's fashion. New politics, new institutions, new laws. Innovation is obviously good. Through humanity's endless curiosity and creative genius, we have made dramatic progress economically, technologically and in living standards
