Public Masses have resumed!

We're delighted that the celebration of public Mass has resumed in our church.

From Monday to Friday, Mass will be celebrated at 10 am and 12:45 pm,

on Saturday at 10 am and 6:30 pm (Vigil Mass), and on Sunday at 10 am and 11:30 am.

Currently, attendance is limited to 50 but this is expected

to rise in the near future.

While we're delighted to be able to welcome people back – and we know that many have been distressed not to be able to attend and to receive Holy Communion – it's essential that we observe carefully all the guidelines to keep us safe. We know only too well the trail of sickness and death which this deadly disease has left it is wake. We must do all we can to protect each other from the risk of infection, so:

-Don't come to church if you have any symptoms associated with the disease: fever, cough, shortness of breath.

-Sanitize your hands on entry to the church. -Sit only where indicated – all marked seats are 6 feet from the nearest seat.

-Keep a safe distance when coming forward for Communion and when leaving the church.

There is no obligation to attend Mass during this health crisis. This is especially the case for those who are vulnerable as a result of age or medical condition. Do not feel under any pressure to come to Mass.

If you feel uncomfortable coming to church on Sunday, you might like to come on a weekday when numbers are much smaller. You may feel safer to continue to watch broadcast or streamed Mass.

Protecting your Health During Mass

In order to minimise the risk of transmission of the virus, a number of precautions are being taken In line with public health advice:

Communion is being distributed in the hand; Priests and Ministers of the Eucharist will sanitise their hands before distribution and will wear a face mask; There will be no entrance processions; Mass leaflets will not be distributed; The sign of peace will consist of a smile or a bow or a wave, not a handshake; The congregation will not sing during Mass.

Collection baskets will not be circulated; instead, you will be asked to leave donations for the first and second collections in marked boxes at the door.

'Chip' or envelope Collections

The weekly household offering is the main source of income that keeps our church going. We are very grateful to those who continued to drop in their envelopes during the lockdown. Obviously, there has been a serious reduction in income. We are getting by, conscious that many families have also suffered a drop in income.

Contributing what you can enables us to keep the doors open and the lights on. We will shortly have a facility on the parish website where are you can make on line donations to the parish, as well as the weekly collections for the support of clergy and for Share. Your generous support is greatly appreciated.
